IHMS CELEBRATING 175 YEARS OF GOD'S UNCONDITIONAL LOVE FOR ALL

The Congregation of the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary was founded 175 years ago in Monroe, MI by Mother Theresa Maxis Duchemin and Father Louis Florent Gillet, C.Ss.R. In the beginning, there were just three IHM sisters who lived in a log cabin on the banks of the Raisin River. In January 1846, two months after their arrival, the sisters established the Young Ladies' Academy with 40 young women enrolled. The sisters and Father Gillet desired to bring the faith to French Canadian immigrants. By the end of the first decade, the sisters founded schools in and around the area of Monroe, MI. Over



time, they branched out to Philadelphia and Scranton. Today there are three distinct congregations which grew from the small group of three women with Father Gillet in 1845.

- The IHM Congregation in Scranton, PA
- The IHM Congregation in Monroe, MI
- The IHM Congregation in Immaculata, PA

With appropriate care, sisters continue to live independently at the IHM Center and continue in the ministries and mission of the IHM Congregation.

Built in 1961, the IHM Center originally served as a novitiate for young sisters. Today this building is a valued and treasured resource where 51 semi-retired and retired sisters ranging in age from 65 to 90 reside. It also houses the IHM leadership and administration offices and the IHM Welcoming Space and Land Reclamation Project.

There have been numerous changes to the residential facility since the current setting was created almost 60 years ago. As congregation, we are faithful stewards of our resources and after much research and consideration the following new projects have been identified as having the highest priority: a communications system and its related infrastructure, improved fire safety measures, a heat exchanger for the chapel's air conditioning system, and restroom modifications for handicapped accessibility.

As you can imagine, it is quite challenging and expensive to keep our sisters secure and cared for now and into the future. It is our hope that with the financial

support of IHM family, friends, and benefactors we can provide our elder sisters with an environment that prioritizes safety, wellness, and personal independence. Will you please consider a gift to help us provide care for our aging IHM sisters?

In addition to the IHM Center, nearly 100 sisters requiring assisted or skilled care reside at Pascucci Family Our Lady of Peace Residence. Your gift today will honor these dear sisters who spent their lives caring for others. It is now our time to care for them.

GET GROWING THIS SPRING!

The EarthCARE Committee continues to explore climate change as one of the critical issues to which the IHM Congregation is committed and has chosen for prayer, reflection, and action for justice. We're growing in understanding that this is a call to wholeness on every level. The EarthCARE committee invites you to explore how you can best advocate for the world now and into the future

One way to tend to the well-being of our planet is to live with awareness of those who will come after us. We can practice this awareness by consciously selecting and planting native species of trees, shrubs, and flowers which are more resistant to altered habitats, more resistant to local pests and diseases, and more likely to survive into the future. Planting native species has a wider reach because these same species provide food, shelter, and habitat for birds, butterflies, and other pollinators.

The EarthCARE committee is available to provide information and assistance to anyone looking to plant native species. We invite you to contact Sister Donna Korba, IHM at korbad@sistersofihm.org for information about the trees, plants, and flowers native to the places where you live and work.

IHM VOCATION DIRECTOR PARTICIPATES IN STUDENTS' RETREAT

Sister Mindy Welding, IHM, director of vocations, spoke at a retreat for the Catholic schools of the Diocese of Wilmington, DE. The participating schools - Padua Academy, St. Mark's High School, and St. Elizabeth High School - sent 25 junior high school girls to participate in a day exploring "Our life is like a pilgrimage: Where is God taking me?"

Sr. Ann David Strohinger, OSF, presented the opening "What's God saying to me?" Sister Mindy and Abbe Truschel, a young adult involved in the Diocese of Scranton, spoke about pilgrimage as the road of their life - inviting participants to draw a road and look at the peak and valley moments of their lives. Participants used



backpacks, scallop shells, road signs, and markers as symbols, and indicated with what and whom they want to travel. While reflecting on the signs and symbols, students were asked to think about how they want to travel during the next phase in their lives. Sr. Marianne Lallone, IHM, ended the day, discussing what vocation means because the students may be hearing the call of who to be and what to do.

WHY I GIVE – A DONOR'S STORY

A reflection from Michele McDade



Michele and Mark McDade, longtime supporters of the Sisters of IHM.

The IHM sisters have been a part of my life since 1962. While attending St. Patrick's High School, I became aware of the dedication of the sisters who encouraged learning and led such disciplined lives. Two sisters who really impacted my life were Sister Ancilla and Sister Marianne. My husband, Mark, suggested that we honor the sisters by making a donation, and we have been donating whenever we are able. We know what the sisters have done in the past and what they continue to do today to enhance the lives of the less fortunate.

As a former St. Patrick's High School student and Marywood alum, I have been immersed in the teachings of our faith. Through the IHM sisters and their mission of aiding those in need, educating all ethnic groups, and caring for the poorest of the poor, I along with my husband Mark, felt compelled to contribute to such a worthy group.

I can recall our group gathered together in the Curriculum Lab at Marywood which was right across from Sr. Carina's office. My friends and I were talking and laughing loudly. She came out of her office and reprimanded us. No sooner had she left, we were at it again. She returned, smiled at us and told us to leave! Of course, we obeyed. We were totally out of control and no matter how hard we tried to stifle our laughter, nothing worked.

Although she was advanced in age, to me Sister Carina seemed ageless. She genuinely loved teaching and was certainly entertaining. I appreciated her energy. She was a wonderful role model!

We all know that the sisters take vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience. It is important for us to contribute whatever we can to support them since we are the recipients of the knowledge they have imparted to us and the kindnesses they have shown to us when we were under their care.

We know that the sisters appreciate any gifts, no matter how large or small since it is more than they had to begin with. That is why Mark and I encourage others to donate to the sisters who sacrifice their time, effort, and energy to serve wherever there is a need. We remember the vow of poverty that the sisters obeyed and the sacrifices they made. How could we not support them? They gave so much - why can't we share just a little?


