## CAPITAL PROJECTS UPDATE 2021

The safety, wellness, and personal independence of our aging IHM sisters are of foremost importance to the congregation and to all those who share a deep love for the sisters. Thanks to the generosity of our family and friends, work has begun on several capital projects at the IHM Center and *Pascucci Family* Our Lady of Peace Residence (OLP). These projects are providing the necessary modifications, improvements, and repairs to accommodate the needs of our elderly sisters.

Many of the 125 semi-retired and retired sisters residing at these two facilities continue to safely serve the IHM mission by helping those in need while earning little or no income. These sisters are tutors, ESL teachers, hospital chaplains, community volunteers, counselors, care takers, pastoral care and prayer ministers.

Project jobs completed include the installation of a new telecommunications system, upgrades to existing restrooms, and replacement of a garden access door. As faithful stewards of our resources, additional projects planned are renovations to the IHM Center dining room, installation of a fire sprinkler system, an air handler and condenser unit for the chapel air conditioning, LED lighting, and replacements of a zone pump, medical carts, flooring, and food service equipment.

#### TELECOMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM

During this ongoing pandemic, facilities across the country, including the IHM Center and OLP, shut their doors to visitors. Social distancing can be especially difficult for older adults, like the sisters, who now must rely on their telephones to stay in touch with loved ones.

The previous telecommunications equipment was installed in sections, over time, beginning in the late 1980s and developed numerous issues and problems. New phones, servers, and LAN equipment which will support our voice and data networks, were recently installed.

# MEDICAL SUPPY FIRM DONATES THERMOMETERS

Sisters of IHM are grateful to LOH Medical, a medical equipment supplier located in Clarks Summit, PA, for their generous donation of 200 infrared forehead thermometers. These thermometers are being used at the IHM Center, *Pascucci Family* Our Lady of Peace Residence, Marywood University, St. Joseph's Center, and Marywood Heights. This gift is enormously helpful for maintaining the safety of our residents and staff during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"We trust that Sisters of IHM will responsibly distribute our donation of thermometers in line with our mission - mobility and independence - to those who need them," said Nadia Richez, general manager, LOH Medical. "If we can prevent even one person or family from getting ill by detecting symptoms early, we can slow the spread of this virus and make a positive impact."

Due to COVID-19, our congregation has implemented safety protocols at both residential facilities. These include temperature screenings of all staff and contractors before they enter either building. Infrared thermometers allow the screening to be completed accurately while maintaining a greater distance between the person being screened and the screener.

# IHM SISTERS CONTINUE MINISTRIES DURING THE PANDEMIC



#### FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK



Dear Friends,

The season of Lent is upon us once more, a season which coincides with springtime and the rebirth of nature and new life. The three traditional practices of Lent are **prayer**, **fasting**, and **almsgiving**. Lent is intended to enrich us by re-awakening our need for God's graces and of our obligation to put others before ourselves.

This past year has made us more aware of our frailty and our strength both as individuals and as a society. In rebuilding a broken world, I have observed the traditional Lenten practices incorporated into the daily lives of so many.

The COVID-19 pandemic is forcing many of us to slow down and spend more time in personal reflection and **prayer**. All over the world and right here at home, people are realizing how empty life is without prayer. Every day, IHM sisters pray for the needs of our world and the many intentions we have received from our beloved families, friends, benefactors, and co-workers.

The social distancing imposed upon us to slow the spread of the virus has forced us to unwillingly **fast** from many things: hugging others outside of our own household, traveling to see extended family members, attending liturgy services and social events, dining at our favorite restaurants, and many more. As a result, people are using the time to do positive things to help themselves and to help others.

During Lent, we are asked to focus more intentionally on almsgiving, which means donating money or goods to the poor and performing other acts of charity. Direct giving—by individual donors to struggling households, local restaurants, essential workers, complete strangers—has exploded during the pandemic. We are also reaching out more to families and friends—especially those that live alone—by letter, phone, email, social media or video platforms.

As a result of the pandemic, are we more conscious of these three Lenten practices - **prayer**, **fasting**, **and almsgiving**? Walking with Christ, how open are we to be changed this Lent because of our experiences during this difficult time?

# FRIENDSHIP GARDEN CONTINUES TO GROW

As part of the IHM commitment to the Care of the Earth, Sister Donna Korba, IHM, agreed to serve on the board of Pennsylvania Power & Light, a statewide interfaith climate organization. Through another board member, Sister Donna connected with the Keystone 10 Million Trees Partnership in their pledge to plant 10,000,000 native trees in Pennsylvania by 2025 as a means to mitigate the effects of climate change.

Sister Donna and EarthCARE Committee members planted 175 native trees on the IHM Center property as part of the land restoration and to celebrate the 175th Anniversary of the Congregation (1845-2020). EarthCARE member Jan Novotka

oversaw the selection of tree species and their placement taking into consideration the native birds, butterflies, and animal life in the Friendship Garden. Infrastructures for the pollinator garden were constructed with a donation from Penn State Master Gardeners. In early spring, more native saplings will be added to the IHM property.


Sara Melick, Marywood University, environmental science professor, and her students helped plant trees,

tested soil, and conducted research. Greg Williams, a PAIPL board member, and Jan ordered and distributed saplings, tubes, and spikes. Sisters Donna and Kate Clancy along with Jan and additional EarthCARE members planted the saplings over many weeks during the pandemic.

The IHM commitment to care for the Earth extends beyond the IHM property as we make new friends and forge new networks with others who share the same allegiance. Various ecological groups and concerned individuals are on board with planting native species along riverbanks and other key areas.

# SISTERS UNDERTAKE RESTORATION OF STATIONS OF THE CROSS

In 1988, a set of 15 symbolic outdoor Stations of the Cross were carved in wood by Sister Ave Maria Foley, IHM, a resident of Our Lady of Peace Residence in memory of her mother Anna. Anna's name is carved into several of the stations, and Sister Ave's name, along with IHM and OLP, are carved into station VI. The stations were installed near the Theresa Maxis Center and near the site of Our Lady of Peace Residence, until they were removed for the construction of the new residence in 2005.

In gratitude to Sister Emerita, Sister Maryalice Jacquinot's father offered to oversee the relocation of the stations in 2006 to the path between the hermitages and Our Lady of Lourdes

Shrine. Sister Emerita worked at Marywood with Mr. Jacquinot's favorite aunt, Bea Reidy, when his mother passed away shortly after his birth. When Sister met Mr. Jacquinot 60 years later, she recalled praying for him at the request of his aunt.

Two years ago, several sisters noticed that one of the stations had a large hole in it, as if it had been pecked by a woodpecker. There were some cracks in a few others. IHM sisters Babette Opferman and Marianne Knight decided to undertake the project of restoring these carvings. The stations were reinstalled this past fall. What a great gift to see the carvings restored to life again!

A few years ago, Marilyn visited Scranton with Mary Lynn to attend Sr. Lisa Perkowski's First Profession of Vows. Her connection with the IHMs grew even deeper after meeting Sister Maryla and also spending time at an IHM convent.

Daily life for elderly and disabled sisters becomes more manageable with furniture designed specifically for the physical challenges they face. Funding from SOAR! allowed the congregation to purchase tables and chairs that greatly improved our elderly sisters' comfort and addressed their safety needs for many years to come. #### DINING ROOM

A dining room on the ground floor of the IHM Center is where meals are prepared and served twice daily. Sharing meals and conversation with other sisters is oftentimes the highlight of a sister's day. The new dining area will continue to be used as a space for sisters' gatherings, celebrations, funeral receptions, special events, and congregation and community meetings. Projects included in the dining room renovation were chosen based on their potential to improve the sisters' overall safety, well-being, and quality of life.

#### **RESTROOMS**

The restrooms adjacent to the IHM Chapel were renovated to improve accessibility for disabled sisters and guests.

#### **GARDEN ACCESS DOOR**

The replacement of a rear side entrance door has enhanced the security, increased the ease of access, and improved the energy efficiency at the IHM Center. This door is used by IHM sisters to enter from the adjacent parking area and as a fire escape from the back stairwell. It allows for wheelchair entry and exit to the
